has more than **81,500 citizens** worldwide and employs more than **14,500 individuals**.

The tribe's treaty territory includes 7,648 square miles of south-central Oklahoma.

It encompasses all or parts of 13 Oklahoma counties, including Bryan, Carter, Coal, Garvin, Grady, Jefferson, Johnston, Love, Marshall, McClain, Murray, Pontotoc and Stephens.

The tribal government is a democratic republic and was modeled after the federal government of the United States. Registered voters elect a governor and a lieutenant governor, 13 members of the tribal legislature and three justices on the tribal Supreme Court.


In fiscal year (FY) 2024, the Chickasaw Nation Certificate of Degree of Indian Blood (CDIB) office issued 3,000 CDIB cards to eligible individuals and nearly 3,400 Chickasaw citizenship cards.



Disaster Relief

Following the devastating impact of the April 27 disasters in Sulphur and Marietta, the Chickasaw Nation assembled teams and resources to aid in rescue and cleanup efforts.

During 2024, the disaster relief program assisted citizens and employees.

The Strong Foundation provided mental health services.

Emergency management provided operational support, including a 7-day deployment of the command post in Sulphur and daily drone damage assessments.

The Inchokma medical unit participated with Emergency Management on deployment for disaster relief.

Mapping of natural disasters has become ever more important as disasters continue to increase across the country. In 2024, Geospatial mapped 230 tornadoes, 6 wildfires, 1 hailstorm and 3 floods. Mapping allows us the ability to reach out to families and individuals impacted by natural disasters to offer assistance.

We assisted many Chickasaw families through emergency/disaster programs.

Roads AND BRIDGES

The Chickasaw Nation Roads Program is working in seven Oklahoma counties on 13 bridge projects with \$16 million in federal funding.

The improvement of these roads and bridges within the Chickasaw Nation keeps roads in drivable conditions and individuals safe by repairing and replacing dangerous or outdated structures.



Nearly 20 miles of roadway including **Lonnie Abbott Blvd.** in Ada, Oklahoma have been repaired in 2024.



FIVE TRIBE Wildlife Management Reciprocity Agreement

The Inter-Tribal Council of the Five Civilized Tribes announced the Five Tribe Wildlife Management Reciprocity Agreement at the July 2024 quarterly meeting. This agreement allows hunting and fishing licenses issued through each tribe to be recognized by the other tribes that are party to the agreement, on respective reservation land.





Veterans Conference

The Chickasaw Veterans Conference took place June 7 at the WinStar Convention Center. Attendees heard from speakers, explored programs and services booths, and were able to spend time with and meet fellow veterans.

Chikasha Academy ADULT IMMERSION PROGRAM (CAAIP)

The Chikasha Academy Adult Immersion Program began in 2022 as a three-year, full-time program to create intermediate Chickasaw conversational speakers.

In 2024, nearly 1,150 contact hours were completed by academy members. The first CAAIP class will graduate in early 2025.



Chickasaw HISTORICAL SOCIETY

The year 2024 marked the 30th anniversary of the Chickasaw Historical Society.

Established by tribal law April 15, 1994, this society works to preserve and protect Chickasaw culture and family traditions. There are currently more than 300 members.





Art Festivals and Markets

To promote the artistry and talents of Chickasaw and First American artists, the Chickasaw Nation hosts various art shows and competitions throughout the year.

More than 180 awards were presented with nearly 80 honoring Chickasaw artists.



Artesian Arts Festival

More than **15,500** people visited Sulphur to celebrate First American art and culture.

The festival featured **148** First American artists from **20** federally recognized tribes including **73** Chickasaw citizens.

Southeastern Art Show and Market (SEASAM)

The show takes place each year during the Chickasaw Annual Meeting and Festival. More than **50** of the **100** First American artists were Chickasaw.









Hushtola Art Market

This new art market took place at the WinStar Convention Center.

Nearly **100** First American artists from **25** federally recognized tribes participated.

More than **50** of the artists were Chickasaw citizens.



DEVELOPMENT

Completed and ongoing projects in the Chickasaw Nation strengthen our community as we continue to grow deeper roots for lasting sustainability.





Chickasaw Heritage Center

A groundbreaking for the new Chickasaw Heritage Center took place in Tupelo, Mississippi on June 26.

The campus will include more than 150 acres and a 10,000-squarefoot exhibit hall, theater, cafe, art gallery, gift shop, playground and collections areas. Walking trails on the campus will connect to the Natchez Trace Parkway's National Scenic Trail.







Tishomingo GYM

The newest Chickasaw Nation Gymnasium opened in Tishomingo on February 29, 2024.

Inside the more than 12,000-squarefoot gymnasium, visitors will find a basketball court, built-in bleachers, locker rooms and concessions.



Chickasaw Nation YOUTH ACTIVITY CENTER

A new Chickasaw Youth Club is the most recent addition to Chickasaw youth resources in the Ardmore area.

The facility includes classrooms, a kitchen, a dining room and outdoor play areas including a half basketball court and large playground.









Ada Child DEVELOPMENT CENTER

Construction is underway for the new Ada Child Development Center located on the Ada South Campus.

This facility will include classrooms, indoor play areas, a commercial kitchen, storm shelter areas and more.

EDUCATION

The campus tour series is a postsecondary education program that provides Chickasaw citizens between the ages of 13-18 the opportunity to tour college campuses while learning about admission, financial aid and potential degree paths.



College visits included Rose State College, University of Central Oklahoma, Oklahoma State University, University of Science and Arts of Oklahoma and Mid-America Christian University.

This provides funds for housing, utilities, living expenses and more, helping students overcome barriers to postsecondary education. More than \$1.2 million was awarded to nearly 3,600 students in 2024.

Chickasaw Elders HOMELAND TOUR

For five days, a group of Chickasaw elders observed their rich cultural heritage and explored significant historic sites in Alabama, Mississippi and Tennessee.

The inaugural Elders Homeland Tour took place in April with 18 Chickasaw elders and 12 companions in attendance. Each stop, from the revered Piominko statue in Tupelo, Mississippi, to the poignant Chokka' Falaa' monument, offered a chance to honor their ancestors and celebrate their identity.

Toni Walker of Mill Creek, Oklahoma, was among those on the first tour.

"That was my first time to go and it was very educational," Walker said. "We learned about the mounds that were established, how they were built, and saw historical monuments." 18 Chickasaw Elders

Walker was also able to attend this tour with his brother, Virgil. "It was great spending time with my brother," Walker said. "To have a week together, we felt at home."

Attendees used this time to strengthen their connection with the Chickasaw Homeland and meet other Chickasaws.

Sandra Williams traveled from Texas to attend the second tour that took place in September. Her most memorable moments were seeing the Piominko statue and visiting the mounds. "The third mound we visited was very serene and I felt a connection to our ancestors," Williams said.

"Being with other Chickasaws, it felt like a homecoming; a reunion," Williams said.

Chickasaw elders 60 years of age or older can participate in the Chickasaw Elders Homeland Tour. An elder is only required to submit one application for consideration of future tours. Two Homeland tours take place each calendar year, with elder applications being selected at random.

The Chickasaw Senior Golf Academy gives seniors the opportunity to enjoy golf and connect with other golfers.

This year, three academies took place at the WinStar Golf Course with more than 120 participants.









Senior Services

Senior services provide resources for Chickasaw citizens aged 60 and older. Programs and services range from health, nutrition and home care to supplemental supplies and more.

In 2024, senior centers served more than 91,000 congregate meals, NEARLY 33,000 HOMEBOUND MEALS and more than 500 curbside meals.



The Impa Imma Program for refrigerated meals served more than 3,160 elders.

More than 800 refrigerated meals were provided to elders through the Native American Caregiver Program.



In 2024, **MORE THAN 128,000 MEALS** were provided to Chickasaw elders.

EMPLOYMENT

The Chickasaw Nation is dedicated to preparing citizens to enter the workforce. Trainings and services pave paths for development in many career fields.





Chickasaw BUSINESS NETWORK

The Apelachi Business Center and Preferred Vendor Program make up the Chickasaw Business Network.



As a business incubator, the Apelachi Business Center launched in February 2024 to support First American startups and existing businesses. Services include financial and marketing assistance, contract education and business management training. In 2024, the Chickasaw Business Network also added more than 90 Preferred Vendors to the program.



Internship PROGRAM

Chickasaw citizens 18-25 who are full-time college students and have a GPA of at least 2.5 can take part in a 6-10 week internship with the Chickasaw Nation. Since the program was implemented in 2004,

500 CITIZENS

have interned with the Chickasaw Nation, **including 30 this year.**

Toksali SMART

The Toksali SMART program gives students aged 14-21 the opportunity to gain experience and training in the workforce. Participants earn wages, explore careers, gain skills and receive mentoring.

- Support services for gaining and retaining employment



Head Start, preschool and child development centers (CDC) offer children a nurturing, educational environment to develop skills, interact and encourage exploration.

The Sick Child Care program assists families with mildly ill children between 3 months and 12 years of age who are too sick to attend school or another child care setting.

In 2024, more than 2,800 children were assisted by early childhood and child care programs.









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Since 1995, more than **12,000 children** have benefited from this program.



Car Seat SAFETY

Free child car seat inspections and education are available through the car seat safety program.

Certified passenger safety technicians perform the checks by appointment and at scheduled community events. Technicians ensure the seat is properly installed in the vehicle, correctly fits the child and is in good condition.



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



Since the Chickasaw Nation assumed administrative and operational control of the Carl Albert Indian Health Facility, and the Chickasaw Nation Health System formed in 1994, our services have continued to grow to promote the overall health of our citizens.

Through the Chickasaw Nation Medical Center (CNMC), health clinics, wellness centers, nutrition programs, initiatives and more, there are many opportunities to maintain physical, spiritual and mental well-being.

At-Large MENTAL WELLNESS PROGRAM

Chickasaw citizens living outside of the Chickasaw Nation can find support for mental wellness through mental health referrals and supplemental funding.

Resources are available through the At-Large Mental Wellness Support Program provided by Outpatient Services.



In 2024, Outpatient Services assisted MORE THAN **9,800 individuals.**

Summer EBT

The summer EBT served school districts in all 13 counties of the Chickasaw Nation and in all 11 counties of the Choctaw Nation, as well as Cleveland, Hughes, Pottawatomie and Seminole counties.

HOUSING

Meeting the housing needs of our citizens continues to be of vital importance to the Chickasaw Nation. Providing services to help with home ownership, rental assistance and housing improvement is essential to enhancing the overall quality of life of the Chickasaw People.





Down Payment/Closing Cost ASSISTANCE GRANT

The program provides a one-time benefit to Chickasaw citizens to assist with down payment and/or closing costs or rate/term refinance of their primary residence.



Homeowner PREPAREDNESS GRANT

The storm shelter program expanded and is now the Homeowner Preparedness Program.

Citizens can receive assistance in preparation for emergencies and natural disasters. Eligible items include storm shelters, storm shutters, generators, sandbags and pier wrapping. Citizens can reapply after 15 years and elders can reapply after 5 years or if their circumstances have changed.





Veterans Housing

Six new homes were built to provide housing for veterans facing home insecurity in Ada, Oklahoma.

Each home features more than 1,000 square feet of space for living with two bedrooms, bathroom and kitchen. They include a fenced yard and a driveway with two parking spaces.



HUD Visit

Officials from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) visited April 17 for a tour of the Chickasaw Nation and to discuss successful projects funded through HUD programs.



Locations of interest included stops at the Chickasaw Housing Administration building, Chickasaw Nation Medical Center, Chickasaw Veterans Lodge and housing provided to veterans in need. Special attention was placed on visiting the Chickasaw Nation's Hilltop Meadows Addition.

AT-LARGE

Chickasaw citizens live in all 50 states and 11 countries around the world. We provide all citizens, near and far, with programs, services and opportunities to connect and prosper.



Access to Health Care

At-large citizens are connected with resources such as eyeglasses, health care providers and financial assistance for vital dental and medical needs.

In 2024, **TRIBAL HEALTH** provided reimbursements of nearly **5.8** million







Handicapped ACCESSIBILITY GRANT

Nearly 60 Chickasaw citizens received a grant in 2024 to make their home handicapped accessible.




